The Heart of Catholic Social Teaching (CST)

From its earliest days, the Church has proclaimed the sacredness of every human life. Modern CST writings began with the Bishop of Rome/Pope, Pope Leo XIII's [Rerum Novarum](#) (1891), which insisted that communities must honor the dignity of workers and protect the vulnerable. Every person is made in God's image and therefore deserves respect and conditions that allow them to flourish.

In 2024, the Church has continued this legacy with [Dignitas Infinita](#), calling us to uphold human dignity in the face of globalization, climate change, and digital technology. The Church writes:

"A world that forgets the dignity of one person will soon forget the dignity of all."

Generational Developments in Catholic Social Teaching

- Early 20th century: Pius XI's [Quadragesimo Anno](#) (1931) expanded CST's critique of unrestrained capitalism.
- Mid-century: John XXIII's [Pacem in Terris](#) (1963) articulated universal human rights.
- Vatican Council II: [Gaudium et Spes](#) (1965) called the Church to share in each person and communities' joys and sufferings.
- Recent popes: John Paul II, Benedict XVI, and Francis wove together economic justice, solidarity, and care for creation.
- Pope Leo XIV: Challenges us to defend dignity amid [AI For Good Summit](#), [AI Ethics and Corporate Governance](#), [Migrants and Refugees](#), mass displacement, and ecological crises.

Be the voice of those who have no voice in calling for justice and respect for human dignity. Be light and salt where the flame
